

### **Inspiration at ACC library**

Artists at all stages of their careers may find keys to new pursuits at the American Craft Council (ACC) Library. More than 3,000 artists appear in a collection that came about before the digital age...there are photographs, slides, correspondence and other ephemera that give behind-the-scenes insight into individuals' development. Those working in the two-dimensional and fine art mediums often take inspiration from sources and themes in common with craft.

In addition, the library has more than 15,000 books and exhibition catalogues, more than 140 current subscriptions and 700 bound volumes of leading periodicals.
