Thinking Outside the Box: Northeast Arts Scene

Northeast is a vibrant conglomeration of year-round artist open studios, music and performance events, cool restaurants and craft breweries...But where are the art galleries? I'm talking about the brick-and-mortar blue chip galleries with regular hours that showcase a stable of nationally and internationally-renowned artists?

Commercial galleries seem to pop up, then disappear on a regular basis. The decline in the economy during the Great Recession put countless commercial galleries out of business.

Based on his experience, and in talking to other art businesses in the area, Josh Blanc relates that a gallery must sell at least forty to fifty \$100 - \$500 works every month to stay afloat. Selling fewer pieces of artwork priced in the thousands to tens of thousands of dollars might cover a portion of gallery overhead and expenses. It's a tough and fickle business.

A plethora of business owners, individuals, and organizations in Northeast are thinking outside the box of the stuffy, conventional art gallery. Artist-run galleries Kolman & Pryor Gallery, Icebox Quality Framing & Gallery (both located in the Northrup King Building), Rogue Buddha Gallery on 13th Avenue, and 2001 A Space on 5th Street present dynamic-and at times controversial-exhibits of regional, national and international artists. These galleries provide es-

Artist cooperatives, and experimental and alternative spaces are rejuvenating the Arts District through a variety of artist opportunities.

Rosalux is Minnesota's longest running collective art gallery (founded in 2002). Rosalux consists of 20 contemporary visual artists whose work can be found in major collections all over the world, and who have received prestigious grants, residencies, and awards.

On2 gallery regularly features artists with studios on the second floor of the California Building. The Solar Arts, Grain Belt,

Northrup King, and Casket Arts buildings host pop-up and special arts events.
